Note: I have used the term "remastered" in some recent entries below to describe the varying modern methods used by stamp printers to obtain a new die from an existing one created perhaps decades earlier, much like the music industry does when taking an old original recording and then recreates it today. The main processes employed by the printers could be Kobex, Crona, or some other unknown method. Previously the process would have been done by transfer rolling the original die.

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





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The castles were re-issued without the original engraved heads owing to Royal Mail's concerns about the risks posed by colour photocopiers that were capable of creating realistic forgeries. SICPAs colour-changing Optically Variable Ink costing £1,000 per kilo, rather than standard pigmented inks at around £25, was used by Harrison for the head, while two elliptical perforations added further security.
